# Kitten Feeding Schedule & Growth Chart

**DO NOT USE COW MILK**

**Never feed a kitten cow's milk or human baby formula as this causes stomach upset and severe diarrhoea. If a kitten is already dehydrated, this could prove fatal. This includes condensed/evaporated canned cow's milk**

On Crete '[Baby Cat Milk](#)' is available from vets & comes with a bottle & spare teats. It costs @€22 per can (3 sachets) & usually it takes 2-3 cans for a litter of 4.

If you can't get hold of cat milk use this solution until you can use:

## Oral rehydration Solution

The recipe is as follows:

- Boil 2 cups of water;
- Add 5 teaspoons of sugar and stir until it dissolves;
- Add 1/4 teaspoon of salt and stir until it dissolves; and
- Allow the mixture to cool. It must be warm, but not hot.

The solution must be refrigerated. Warm it before serving. Only use for a maximum of 24 hours.

Number of feeds per day	Total Formula required per day
Birth to 1 week: Feed every 3 hours (8 feedings/day)	Up to 1 week: 24ml
From 1 to 3 weeks: Feed every 4 hours (6 feedings/day)	1 week: 32ml
From 3 to 4 weeks: Feed every 5 hours (5 feedings/day)	2 weeks: 54ml
From 4 to 5 weeks: Feed four to five times/day.	3 weeks: 80ml
	4 weeks: 104ml
	5 weeks: 128ml

<p><b>Weight chart</b> (approximates)</p> <p><b>Birth weight</b> 100g</p> <p><b>Day 3 – 5</b> 130 – 150g; umbilical cord falls off</p> <p><b>Day 9 – 12</b> 210g; eyes and ears will open</p> <p><b>14 days</b> 230g; starts strolling about a little</p> <p><b>16 days</b> 265g; starts cleaning itself and playing</p> <p><b>21 days</b> 325g; starts to walk</p>	<p><b>25 days</b> 360g; first teeth coming through</p> <p><b>28 days</b> 400g; rest of the milk teeth are coming through; 1st deworming with Panacure; start litter box training</p> <p><b>5 weeks</b> 480g; becoming housetrained, can run pretty well</p> <p><b>6 weeks</b> 540g; no longer need for bottle-feeding ; has all milk teeth; can go without mother's milk and can eat independently; 2nd deworming</p> <p><b>8 weeks</b> 600 – 700g; 1st vaccination (ask for vaccination passport; 3rd deworming</p> <p><b>10 weeks</b> 850g</p> <p><b>12 weeks</b> 1000 - 1100 grams; 2nd vaccination</p> <p><b>Kittens should gain &gt;10g per day</b></p>
